# **Director's Recognition Award**

Extraordinary contributions to TLDSB by staff members, students, school volunteers, or community members are recognized each Board meeting by the Director of Education. The following individuals were nominated in recognition of outstanding commitment and dedication to TLDSB.

## Recipients:

Garry Thompson, Campbell Bus Lines Route M241 Driver Huntsville Public School Students Kennedy and Corbyn Huntsville High School Student Aspen

On January 13, 2025 bus driver Garry Thompson detected that there was something wrong with the bus he was driving during his morning route. Even though he was close to the next school drop-off location, he immediately recognized that there was a potential risk to student safety and pulled the bus over. Garry acted calmly and decisively in selecting three reliable student riders to help him to implement the evacuation protocol and to move all riders to a safe location.

Students Kennedy, Corbyn, and Aspen assisted without hesitation, followed directions from the driver, and remained calm while helping to evacuate the other student riders and ensure that everyone remained a safe distance from the bus. The driver re-boarded the bus to call dispatch to request that they contact emergency services and send a recovery bus. The driver then conducted and third check of the bus to ensure that every student rider had evacuated. When the recovery bus arrived, the three volunteer students demonstrated leadership and care in assisting the other riders to board the new bus to continue their rides to school.

After the recovery bus left the scene with the students, a fire did start in the engine area, eventually engulfing the bus. Mr. Thompson's instincts, his calm, decisive actions, and the assistance of the students are the reasons that no one suffered any injuries and the damage was contained to the bus and did not impact any other structures in the community.

TLDSB would like to formally recognize and thank driver Garry Thompson, Huntsville High School Student Aspen, and Huntsville Public School Students Corbyn and Kennedy for remaining calm in a crisis, and for demonstrating outstanding leadership, quick-thinking, and dedication to student safety. We are grateful that you were on bus route M241 that day; your responses ensured that this incident had the best possible outcome.

## **Purpose**

To provide Trustees with an update on strategies and supports to promote student attendance.

## Context

TLDSB's 2022-2027 Strategic Plan goals include supporting meaningful learning and success for all.

TLDSB is working to create safe, caring, and inclusive learning environments, and to foster mentally healthy schools where all students feel that they belong. Educators can best support students with academic achievement and well-being when they regularly attend school.

TLDSB staff are actively monitoring student attendance rates, promoting the importance of student attendance through a year-long attendance campaign, and supporting daily attendance via a number of programs and initiatives. The goal is to increase public understanding that positive student attendance and engagement is an indicator of long-term student success, and to reiterate that regular school attendance should not be seen as optional (with the understanding that there are occasional unavoidable reasons that it is necessary that a student is absent such as due to illnesses or appointments etc.).

#### Content

The TLDSB Senior Team is focussed on two main facets of student attendance:

- 1) Promoting and supporting daily attendance for *all* students, and,
- 2) Providing supports through the Re-Engagement Counsellors to improve attendance for students who struggle with persistent absenteeism.

The informational graphic below is an example of the impact of regularly missing school



See how quickly the days add up in a school year.

Below is an outline of a number of targeted ways that TLDSB is promoting and supporting student attendance at school.

## **Community consultation and involvement**

In May of 2024, the Director of Education hosted a Director's Forum on Student Attendance as an opportunity for a cross-section of community- including educators, administrators, community partners, Trustees, and parents/guardians- to discuss some of the factors that may be contributing to poor student attendance and engagement, to discuss potential barriers to attendance, and to brainstorm ways in which TLDSB and the community can encourage, support, and promote regular school attendance.

Recommendations from the meeting helped to inform planning for 2024-2025.

## Promoting positive attendance for all students

In partnership with the Communications Department, the Director of Education and the Senior Team began a 'Attendance Matters' campaign in 2023-24 that will continue throughout the 2024-25 school year.



This campaign includes direct-to-home letters to families, social media posts, and the provision of informational graphics and data related to absenteeism (e.g., the impact of missing even one day of school per month). Links to resources and recommendations for strategies and routines to support regular attendance are also promoted via the campaign.

In addition, families are receiving regular reminders on inclement weather days that staff continue to be in schools and available to provide academic supports for students if parents/guardians are able to arrange safe transport for their child(ren) to and from school.

### Proactive strategies and targeted interventions to support all students

All schools in TLDSB engage in regular, ongoing, actions and strategies to support student wellness and to promote attendance and engagement for all students. Examples include but are not limited to:

- ongoing school-to-home communication;
- parent/guardian engagement opportunities;
- · school nutrition programs;
- social and extracurricular opportunities;
- opportunities for support for personal needs via the Feed All Four Fund;
- social emotional learning and learning about healthy habits;
- a focus on belonging and fostering mentally health school environments.

In addition, school staff regularly discuss attendance support strategies, monitor data at staff meetings and on Professional Development Days, review classroom and student profiles, and endeavour to ensure that all students have made a connection with at least one caring and trusted adult in the school whom they feel that they can approach with any academic, social, or other concerns.

#### Ongoing interventions for students with chronic or persistent absenteeism:

TLDSB maintains ongoing additional support for students who are struggling with persistent/chronic absenteeism, including but not limited to:

- working with students, staff, and community to better understand the root causes of absenteeism and barriers to attendance:
- tracking and reviewing attendance data at in-school team meetings on a regular basis;
- increasing school-to-home communication;
- working on targeted strategies at school (e.g., developing strategies to manage stress, understand and name emotions, problem solve, and support social skills);
- interventions such as referrals to Re-Engagement and Mental Health Counsellors;
- encouraging connections to community programs and support;
- offering alternate academic programs when appropriate (e.g., Supervised Alternative Learning program).

## Ongoing monitoring of attendance rates

The Director of Education and the Senior Team regularly monitor the overall attendance rates at all of the elementary schools, and the attendance rates by grade in secondary schools.

The Ministry of Education has set a goal as part of the Student Achievement Plan Framework that all school boards should be working towards improvement of student participation in class time and learning, and has asked Boards to monitor the % of students in grades 1-8 whose individual attendance rate is equal to or greater than 90%.

- As of Spring 2024, the cumulative attendance data for TLDSB demonstrated that 68% of elementary students were in attendance 90% (or more) of their school year and 47% of secondary students were in attendance 90% (or more) of the school year.
- Data as of December 19, 2024 (for September-December of the 2024-2025 school year) showed that 67% of elementary students and 48% of secondary students had attended 90% (or more) of the school days to date.

The data tracked includes absences for illness, truancy, excused absences and unexcused absences, but does not count absences for inclement weather days, sports, or educational field trips.

#### Attendance pilot projects for target schools

In follow-up to the Director's Forum on attendance held in spring 2024, under the leadership of Associate Superintendent Tanya Fraser and the TLDSB Re-Engagement Counsellors, 4 Elementary Schools and 1 Secondary School were identified as part of a pilot project for targeted attendance interventions.

The goal of the project is to improve student attendance by identifying students with persistent absences, assessing reasons for absenteeism, and implementing site-specific solutions. The pilot was launched in September 2024. Key strategies in place at pilot schools include:

- attendance champion team established who meet regularly to evaluate data and progress;
- attendance goal setting that includes voice from students and parents;
- staff learning (lunch and learns/staff meetings) to deepen staff understanding of barriers and reasons for absenteeism:
- collaboration with Re-engagement Counsellors, Mental Health Counsellors and Inschool/student success team.

## **Purpose**

To provide Trustees with an update regarding the feedback and input received in the most recent Parent/Guardians Feedback Surveys.

#### Context

TLDSB's 2022-2027 Strategic Plan goals include the following in relation to commitments to the TLDSB Community:

- **1.9** Learn from families, trustees, community agencies, and businesses about what constitutes meaningful learning and success for all students.
- **2.13** Learn from the wisdom of families and community members, particularly those who have been historically and are presently marginalized, and thoughtfully act upon what we hear to ensure they feel heard and valued as important partners in student achievement and success.

To support these goals, TLDSB strives to:

- provide effective, meaningful, and timely communication to families and the community;
- offer relevant parent/guardian engagement opportunities through panels, speakers' series, committees, and board and school-based events, and,
- seek input and feedback from parent/guardians in relation to student achievement and well-being on a regular and ongoing basis.

#### Content

The Director of Education, in partnership with the Communications Department, has released four surveys since fall of 2022 requesting input from parents/guardians related to how they feel about the school year, and asking for recommendations on how TLDSB can support students in having the best possible school year.

Survey participation:

October 2022 1615 responses
 October 2023 3896 responses
 June 2024 1441 responses
 October 2024 586 responses

The survey questions were similar across surveys to allow TLDSB to compare trends across time.

Data was analyzed and summarized by the TLDSB Research and Data Officer. A number of trends were identified where the same (or similar) questions were asked across more than one survey.

#### Assessing a general feeling about the school year:

All surveys posed a question asking parent/ guardians to use a 1-5 scale to rate how they felt the beginning of the school year (October surveys) or the school year in general (for the June survey) had been for their children and family.

Results showed that overall parents have a positive impression of the school year at the beginning of the school year. The responses became more neutral by the Spring.

- Fall surveys show more positive ratings (4 or 5);
- Nearly half of parents gave a neutral rating (3) on the Spring 2024 survey.

## Reflection on learning and well-being:

The three surveys administered in 2023 and 2024 asked parents/guardians to reply to prompts about whether they felt their child's previous learning had prepared them for the current school year, and whether they were aware of the mental health supports available for students.

- Most respondents agree that their children's learning in previous grades has prepared them to succeed in their next grade or in post-secondary pursuits.
  - This trend was relatively stable across time;
  - Over half of respondents agreed or strongly agreed that their children were prepared for success across all of the surveys.
- Across the three surveys there was an increase over time in the number of parents/guardians who indicated that they were aware of the mental health supports and services available to support student well-being.

#### **How TLDSB can support families:**

All four surveys offered the opportunity for parents/guardians to provide suggestions related to actions the Board could take to further support families to have the best school year possible.

This was an open-ended question. The results netted the following recurring themes:

- Across all surveys, learning and achievement of students was the most common theme in parent/guardian open-ended responses.
  - Over one third of responses in the Fall 2023 and 2024 surveys and nearly one half of responses from the Spring 2024 survey address learning and achievement
  - Across all surveys, parents/guardians expressed the need for higher expectations for students' learning, a need for more support for special education, and suggestions related to learning content.

- Communication was the second most addressed theme in both the Fall 2023 and 2024 surveys, indicating that communication is important to parents/guardians- especially at the start of the school year:
  - Many respondents indicated that they would like increased school-level communication with respect to what their children are learning in the classroom, how their children are progressing, and more information on the events and activities occurring at school.

## **Next steps:**

TLDSB actively seeks opportunities to engage parents/guardians through parent/guardian surveys, during TLDSB Committees that include parent/guardian/community membership (District School Council/ Parent Engagement Committee, Special Education Advisory Committee, Indigenous Education Advisory Committee), at board or school events, at community partner breakfasts, and via anecdotal feedback received through Trustees, Board, and/or school staff.

TLDSB will continue to regularly seek out feedback from parents/guardians to assist the Board to make informed decisions and direct system action regarding the improvement of student achievement and well-being, and to provide support and communication for families.

## **Purpose**

To share an update with Trustees related to the January 7, 2025 meeting of the Special Education Advisory Committee.

#### Context

SEAC is a statutory advisory committee that meets ten times per year, as per section 57.1(1) of the Education Act and Ontario Regulation 464/97.

The committee membership includes community partner agency representatives, community members, and trustees. The meeting is chaired by Janice Balfour, with the support of Superintendent Nikki Train and the Department of Special Education Services staff.

The purpose of the committee is to provide feedback and suggestions to Board staff regarding special education programming and initiatives for students.

#### Content

The Special Education Advisory Committee met on Tuesday, January 7, 2025 at the Lindsay Education Centre and the Muskoka Education Centre.

Highlights from this meeting:

- Data on the types of exceptionalities represented across the Board was shared, along with secondary EQAO exemption rates and the number of students with IEPs.
- A permanent communication disorders assistant has been hired, bringing the CDA team up to its full complement, and a posting for a district manager of special education services is up. The position is intended to manage the assessment team.
- For the January 31st professional development day, educational assistant training will be focused on the practical application of supporting students with autism.
- Registration is open for the After Schools Skills Development Program for students with autism and interviews for the instructor and tutor positions are taking place. Once again, the Board has teamed up with LearnStyle to host a virtual coding workshop for Grades 4 to 12. Social skills learning for students in Kindergarten to Grade 2 and Grades 3 to 5 will take place through LEGO clubs and board game clubs respectively.
- The special education consultant team has been working on scripts for educational videos about universal design for learning, accommodations versus modifications, and the discontinuation of IEPs.

The November 5, 2024 minutes that were approved at this meeting are attached. The minutes from the January 7, 2024 meeting will be posted on the TLDSB Committees website following ratifications at the next committee meeting. The December 2, 2024 meeting was cancelled due to inclement weather.

#### 5. Administrative updates

## 5.1 System updates

#### W. Hahn shared the following updates:

 W. Hahn shared that he is happy to report that TLDSB has had significant increases in student achievement with EQAO over the last three years, and this has been highlighted by the Ontario Human Rights Commission for TLDSB's work in early screening for primary reading. He also reported on the continued focus on student attendance which has included messaging to families, implementing the attendance tracking of secondary students, and increasing communications with families who are having difficulty with attendance. W. Hahn informed the committee of the newly implemented PPM 170 which provides direction to school boards on communication with parents/guardians. TLDSB developed a procedure to reflect PPM 170 which establishes a communication protocol for responding to parent inquiries and is now available on the TLDSB website.

## N. Train shared the following updates:

• N. Train presented the 2023-2024 EQAO results for TLDSB students with special needs which indicated that these scores for have room for improvement but most are in line with the province levels. N. Train also presented the results of the 2024-2024 IEP feedback survey which was sent to parents of students with special needs from kindergarten to grade 12, and was sent to students with special needs from grade 7-12. The feedback indicated that students and families were satisfied overall with the development of the IEP. However, students and families reported that they are not receiving regular communication from the classroom teacher regarding the progress of IEP goals. The feedback will be used to increase communication strategies between families and their classroom teachers.

## 5.2 Department updates

#### M. Lefler shared the following updates:

• The Special Education department is collaborating with the Curriculum department when planning professional development and recently hosted the Special Education Resource Teachers, Special Education Department Heads, and Administrators for in person learning. Staff looked at their school's special education data and completed a school portrait which included best approaches to support all students at their school. M. Lefler also shared that the Educational Assistants (EAs) are receiving professional development regarding the topic of Trauma Response Care, and are learning about practices and strategies that will support students who have experienced trauma.

## 6. SEAC projects

#### 6.1 Low enrollment class information cards

N. Train proposed to the idea to create class specific information cards for the special education low enrollment classes to explain to students and families what the anticipated goals of each class are to assist families to understand what supports are in place for each class. The committee was in agreement of this idea.

## 7. Other business

#### 7.3 Association and community news

Community Living Huntsville reported that they attended a panel discussion at the Huntsville High School staff meeting along with other community agencies (OPP, YMCA, etc) and each community agency provided brief description of their services and the teachers were able to ask questions. Community Living Huntsville were also present at the National Day of the Child event at the Bracebridge fairgrounds to provide information and resources on local services for families. HANDS (theFamilyHelpNetwork.ca) hosted a free webinar for parents on school refusal where strategies were presented to parents and caregivers to help their child return to attending school on a more regular basis.

Community Living South Muskoka reported that they were also in attendance at the National Day of the Child in Bracebridge. They were invited to participate in the career's classes at the Gravenhurst High School and talked to the students about the company and how they are a large employer in Muskoka. Community Living South Muskoka also reported that their staff will be participating in upcoming Behaviour Management System training at the Muskoka Education Centre.

FASD ONE reported they are working with CanFASD and Public Health of Canada on developing a training course for early childhood education on FASD to enforce the need to diagnose and identify FASD and how to guide families into making that disclosure and what the next steps are following that disclosure. FASD ONE has joined the Ontario Alcohol Strategy Coalition since the release of alcohol in convenience stores, to ask the Ontario Government to create an alcohol strategy with considerations on whether the increased access to alcohol will result in a reported increase in consumption in younger people or an increase of drivers under the influence of alcohol.

PAC on SEAC informed the committee that they are producing tip sheets on what is happening across the province and how PAC on SEAC can support SEAC's.
