Purpose

To share an update with Trustees related to Pathways and related programs for students.

Context

Pathways represent a large portion of the work the Secondary Curriculum Department. TLDSB's strategic plan state's that TLDSB will make learning authentic, meaningful, and relevant and deepen understanding of multiple pathways.

TLDSB is increasing graduation rates by working to increase the % of students participating in job skills programs like SHSM, Dual Credits and OYAP.

Content

The increase in Pathway participation is encouraging:

Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM) participation has increased 21% in the past 2 years

- Construction continues to be the most sought-after SHSM program by students and is offered at 6 TLDSB high schools
- Transportation and Health and Wellness are also programs of high interest

OYAP participation has increased 37% in the past 2 years.

- TLDSB students are participating in OYAP across a number of different trades
- Historical data shows that TLDSB has had students enrol in OYAP at a rate higher than the provincial average for a number of years
- Carpenter/ Cabinet Maker, Automotive Services, Electrician, and Cook/ Baker are the OYAP programs with the highest participation rates

DUAL CREDIT participation has **increased 4.6%*** in the past 2 years (*spring dual credits start in April; participation is not included in totals).

• Examples of Dual Credit courses offered: Hairstyling, Manicure, Welding, Carpentry Fundamentals, Personal Finance, Electrical Installation

Purpose

To share an update with trustees related to the March 4, 2025 meeting of the Special Education Advisory Committee.

Context

SEAC is a statutory advisory committee that meets ten times per year, as per section 57.1(1) of the Education Act and Ontario Regulation 464/97.

The committee membership includes community partner agency representatives, community members, and trustees. The meeting is chaired by Janice Balfour, with the support of Superintendent Nikki Train and the Department of Special Education Services staff.

The purpose of the committee is to provide feedback and suggestions to Board staff regarding special education programming and initiatives for students.

Content

The Special Education Advisory Committee met on Tuesday, March 4, 2025 at the Lindsay Education Centre and the Muskoka Education Centre.

The meeting covered a range of important topics, beginning with a discussion around attendance and strategies to improve it, including addressing learning loss and emphasizing the importance of in-person learning for social and mental wellness. The board is also focused on enhancing reading instruction and providing support for students with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) and mental health challenges.

Technology use in schools was also addressed, with a focus on balancing its benefits with the need to limit screen time. Professional development for staff, inclusion and diversity initiatives, all of which emphasize collaboration and continuous learning, and a presentation from Autism Ontario provided an overview of their programs and services, including information about the Ontario Autism Program (OAP), access to resources, and support for families and individuals with autism.

The committee also agreed to submit a review of the Additional Qualification (AQ) guidelines for special education courses on behalf of TLDSB.

The February 4, 2025 minutes that were approved at this meeting are attached. The minutes from the March 4, 2025 meeting will be posted on the TLDSB Committees website following ratifications at the next committee meeting.

1. Call to order

Chair J. Balfour called roll and confirmed that a quorum was present.

2. Student voice video – After School Skills Development Program

A video was shared featuring students and staff showcasing the After School Skills Development program. The program seeks to offer social skills learning opportunities for students with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) outside of the school day.

M. Lefler shared some additional details about the program.

3. Approval of agenda

4. Committee action items

4.1 Approval of the minutes of the January 7, 2025, meeting

Moved by A. Rose, seconded by S. Bullock that the minutes dated January 7, 2025 be approved.

5. Administrative updates

5.1 System updates

N. Train shared the following updates:

• Report card writing is now complete as well as the mid-year assessments for literacy and math for Grades 3 and 6. IEPs for secondary students will be reviewed and updated over the next month.

- This year the early reading screener has been added to report cards for students in year two of kindergarten up to Grade 2 to identify if the student reached the benchmark reading level.
- Kindergarten registration is now open and schools are gathering information for new students with special needs as registrations are received.
- Transition planning for Grade 8 students with special education needs is underway to allow time to prepare for their transition to secondary school.
- School inclement weather day school plans have been shared with families and school councils to summarize the learning plan for inclement weather days to ensure continued learning.
- Additional time has been added for special education resource teachers (SERT) to focus on early reading interventions to target schools with the greatest needs.

5.2 Department updates

M. Lefler shared the following updates:

- Last month the leadership meeting with administrators and special education resource teachers participated in continued learning on IEP writing tools focusing on students with a learning disability.
- The psychoeducational assessment team will be providing professional learning on the topic of learning disabilities to assist with IEP writing for math, as provincial assessment results show that TLDSB secondary students with learning disabilities are struggling with math.
- The behavioural intervention resource team is creating guidance documents for teachers on scenarios and topics concerning students with high needs, to provide learning resources that are easily accessible (for example, elopement). The guidance documents will provide direction and strategies to further support students with high needs.
- Staff from various teaching roles will be participating in virtual training courses which provide learning around students with attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) and students with autism spectrum disorder (ASD).
- Professional learning was recently provided to occasional teachers on topics such as toolkits for occasional teachers, core practices for students with ASD, and universal design for learning (UDL). Educational assistants will participate in continued learning around trauma informed practices and safety plans at the next professional development day.

6. SEAC projects

6.1 Project priorities and work plan

M. Lefler reported that the special education consultant team is continuing the work on scripts for educational videos to ensure they are parent friendly.

7. Other business

7.3 Association and community news

S. Bullock shared that February is inclusive education month and Community Living Huntsville is working on providing information to Huntsville area schools. Working with parents on transitions into school for kindergarten students as well as students entering secondary school.

Community Living Huntsville hosted Huntsville's Got Talent last Saturday, an annual fundraiser which features local talent.

D. Callan reported that Five Counties Children's Centre turns 50 years old this year and they will be having a celebration event in Lindsay in September with previous graduates and staff in attendance.

J. Balfour shared that FASD One has participated in learning about alcohol policy through a webinar called The Truth about Alcohol which provided webinars to professionals about affects and harms of alcohol. The Ontario Provincial Alcohol Strategy Group is moving forward with the pre-budget submission to the Ford Government asking for a provincial alcohol strategy as well as an FASD provincial enhanced strategy.
